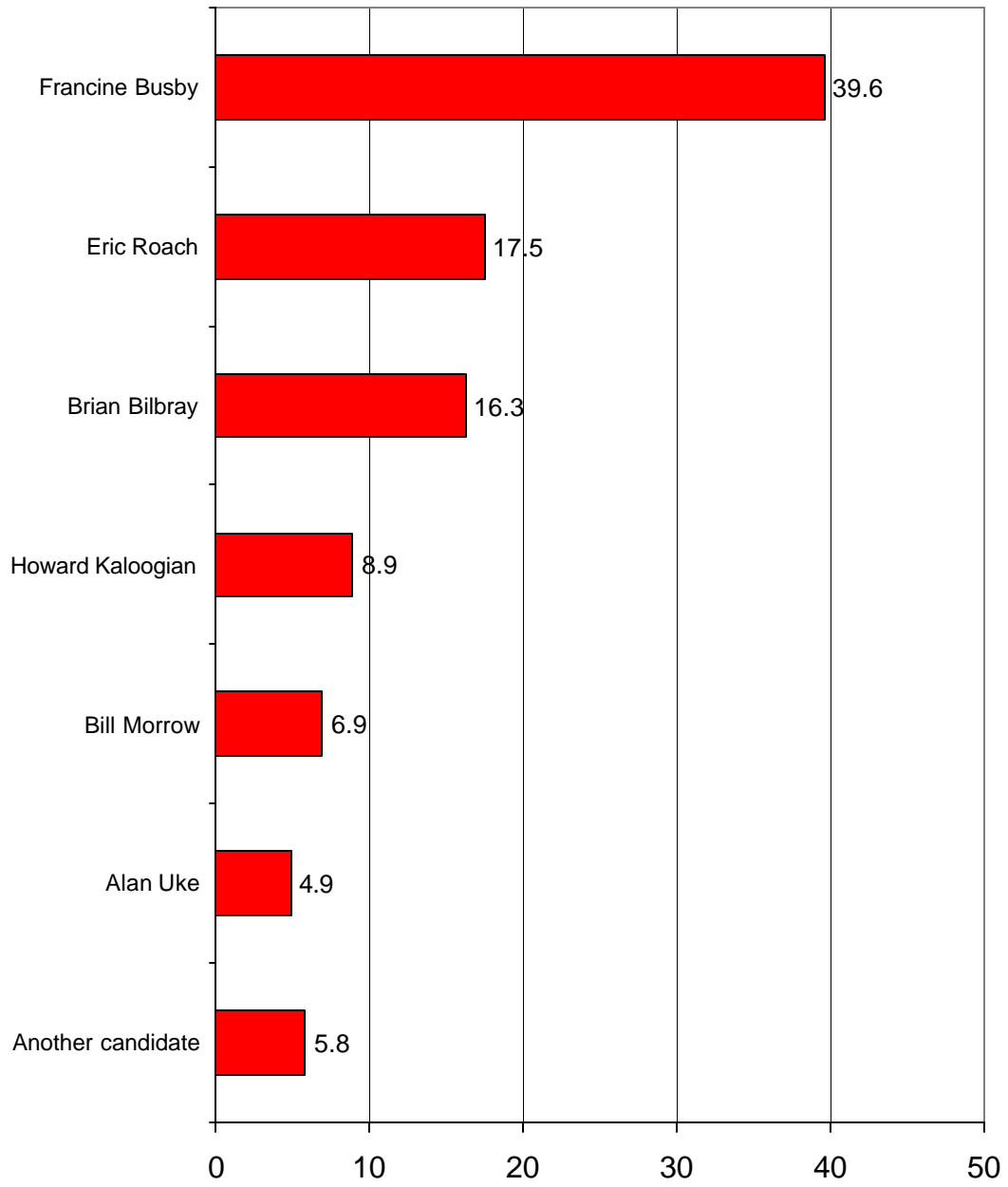

San Diego – Little candidate “movement” was shown in the daily tracking poll released Saturday by Datamar Inc. regarding candidates from all political parties in the 50th Congressional Special Election to be held on Tuesday. This survey questioned *50th Congressional District high-propensity registered voters -- voters who voted in the 2004 Presidential primary and general elections and in the 2002 gubernatorial primary and general elections.*

Methodology: Findings are based on a April 04-07, 2006, telephone survey of 855 high-propensity registered voters in the 50th Congressional District. A proprietary algorithm was used to generate random samples of voters for calling. The sampling error for the total sample is +/- 3.35 percent at the 95 percent confidence level. The sampling error for subgroups is larger. Results are weighted to adjust for variations in the sample for age, gender, political affiliation, and race.

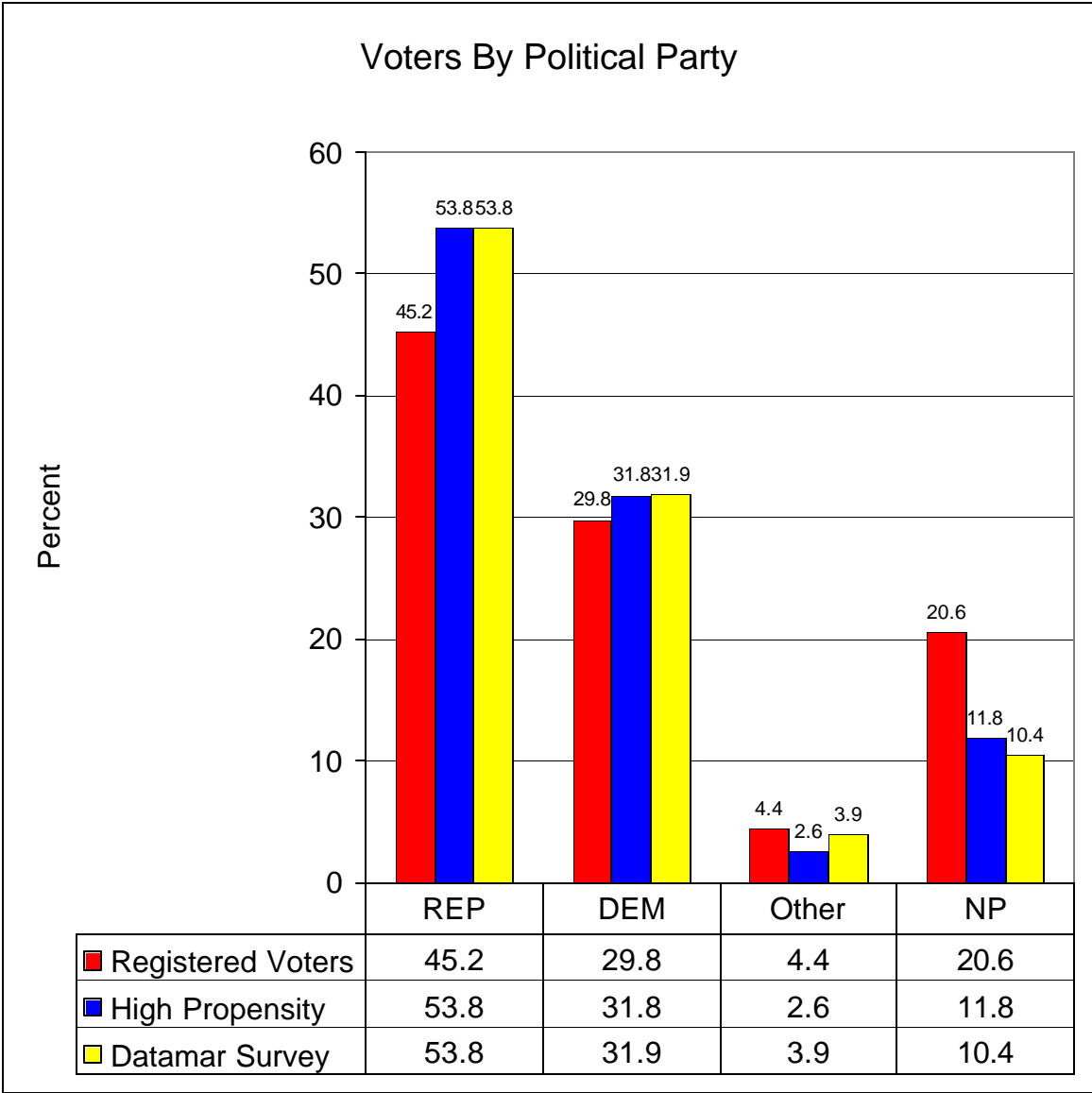
Registered voters vs. high-propensity voters: Registered voters who *actually vote* are significantly fewer than the voters who are registered to vote. Although it is sometimes useful to determine the opinions of all registered voters (and even the opinions of the general population), surveying the opinions of *the high-propensity voters* is more efficient and predictive for electoral/political purposes.

This survey is based on defining “high-propensity” voters as those eligible registered voters who have demonstrated high-propensity by having *actually voted* in one or more recent elections, specifically:

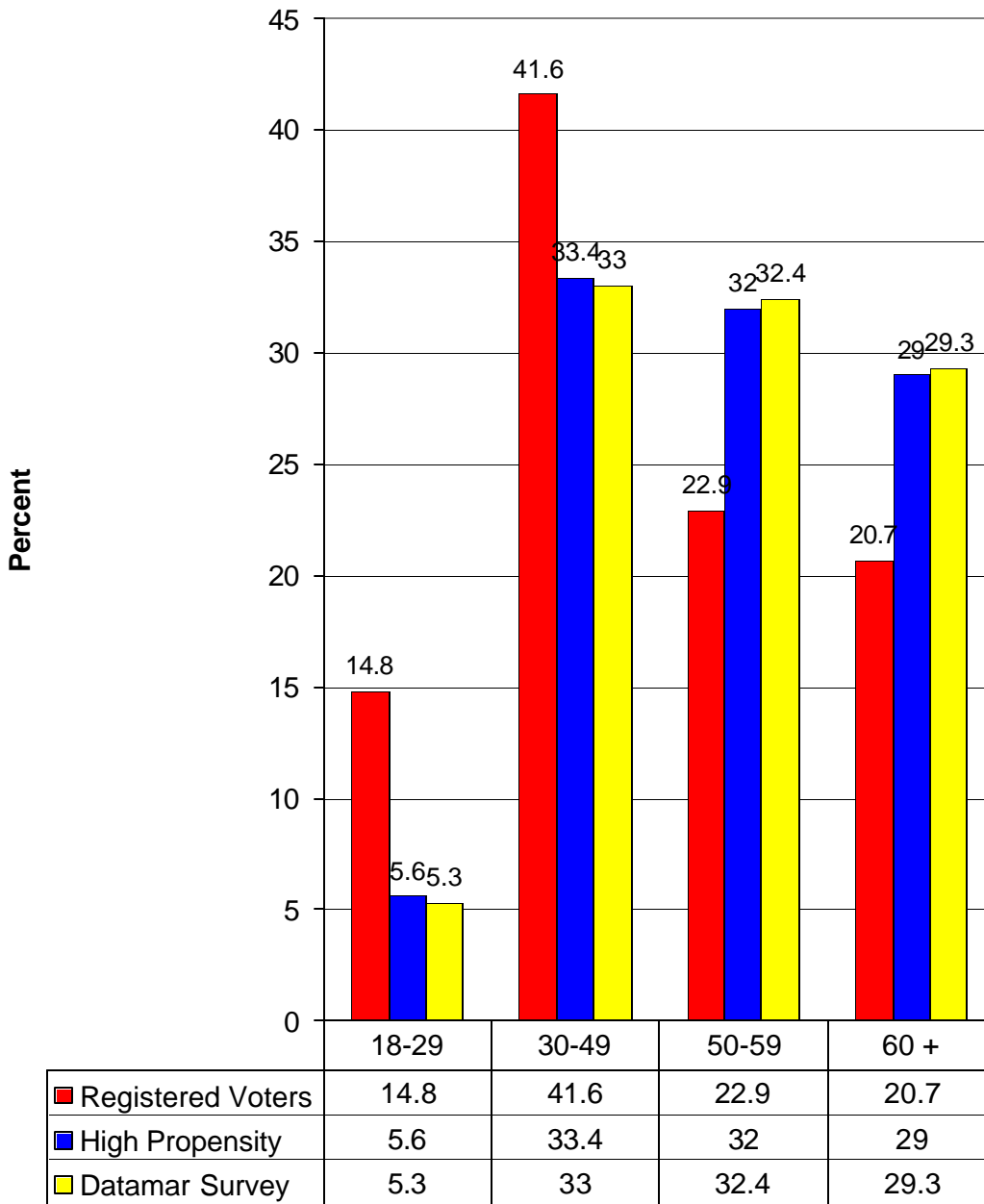
Voted in the 2004 Presidential primary and general elections *and* in the 2002 gubernatorial primary and general elections.

We believe that this performance based definition is superior to other definitions -- for example, labeling as “high-propensity” those registered voters who merely answer “Yes” when asked, “Do you plan to vote in this election?”. The interviewer did not even inquire as to respondents’ “plan” to vote, which we believe to be a generally less accurate predictor of voting than verified recent voting history.
